

#### **School-Family Compact English Version**

Dual Immersion Academy (DIA) faculty and staff, parents/guardians, and students agree that this compact outlines how we will share the responsibility of building and developing a partnership for improved academic achievement in meeting the state's high standards. This compact is in effect during the school year 2023-2024.

#### **School Responsibilities**

Dual Immersion Academy (DIA) will:

1. Provide high-quality curriculum and instruction in a supportive and effective learning environment that enables students to meet the State's student academic achievement standards as follows:

We will use core reading and math programs that will allow us to build a continuum of services from grades K-8. In reading, we use a Balanced Literacy Approach. Balanced Literacy is designed to help all students learn to read and write effectively by giving balanced instructional time to both reading and writing. DIA uses the Wonders/Maravillas program to support instruction at grade level. Students receive instruction as a whole group and also at their individual level through small groups. DIA uses 95% Phonics in English and Heggerty Phonics in Spanish in grades K-2nd. Student progress is continually monitored through monthly progress checks and individual teacher conferencing. Math is taught using Bridges in Mathematics, a standards-based curriculum that promotes critical thinking, conceptual understanding, problem-solving, and fluency through visual and hands-on models. Student progress is monitored using Illuminate, an online diagnostic, that allows teachers to continually check students' progress and understanding and adjust instruction to meet student needs. Dual Immersion Academy will also focus on developing the English Language skills of our English Language Learners by providing language-level-specific instruction to increase English reading, writing, listening, and speaking. Additionally, Dual Immersion Academy will develop Spanish skill levels through Balanced Literacy and the basal program Maravillas. DIA follows the Utah Core Standards curriculum with adjustments made to meet Spanish language standards by Common Core en Español. (https://commoncore-espanol.sdcoe.net/)



# 2. Hold meetings where parents/guardians can learn what it means for them and their children to be part of a school-wide Title I school community.

Academic Parent Teacher Team (APTT) meetings will be held three times per year. APTT meetings give parents and teachers the opportunity to work together to discuss student progress and to make individualized student goals. While attendance is not mandatory, DIA requests the attendance of every parent. If a parent needs to meet with the teacher more often than this or if a problem arises; parents are encouraged to contact the teacher to schedule an appointment. Parents may ask for a meeting at any time and are always welcome to visit the school or classrooms.

During this meeting, the requirements of Title I, Part A programs will be explained and parents will learn of their rights under these programs. Parents will also be given copies of the teachers' expectations known as the "disclosure document" and copies of the Utah Core Standards curriculum and the DIA parent handbook.

#### 3. Create a supportive learning environment.

DIA staff will work closely with families to support student learning. Additional parent meeting times will be available before and after school, as well as during school if necessary. DIA will provide specific interventions for students who are struggling in math and/or reading and will use data to track progress. We also promise to provide translation and interpreting services whenever possible.

### 4. Provide parents/guardians with frequent reports on their children's progress. Specifically, the school will provide reports as follows:

Report cards will be sent home at the end of each trimester. The final day of school is May 31, 2024. Final report cards are sent home via mail the following week. In addition, parents/guardians and students have access to grades and progress reports through our SIS system, Aspire. Additionally, teachers will provide a daily tracking system that monitors behavior and provides kids with reinforcements for positive behaviors if requested and/or deemed necessary.



# 5. Provide parents/guardians reasonable access to staff. Specifically, staff will be available for consultation with parents/guardians as follows:

DIA teachers are available before school beginning at 8:00 a.m. and they remain at school until 4:00 p.m. Substitutes can be provided for teachers so they can be available during the day if parents would like to meet during school hours when an appointment has been arranged. In addition, teachers will schedule, at times outside of these options, at parents' request and according to teachers' availability. Parents/guardians can call the school directly to set up a meeting to discuss any concerns or questions or email their student's teacher directly.

# 6. Provide parents/guardians opportunities to volunteer and participate in their child's class, and to observe classroom activities, as follows:

All parents/guardians are encouraged to participate in school activities as a volunteer, or as an observer when arranged with the teacher. DIA works hand in hand with parents, to provide quality volunteer opportunities throughout the school day and continuously throughout the school year.

We know that we need to work as partners with parents and families to provide the best services to our students. We are excited to welcome parents as additional teachers in the child's life and recognize parents are very important in helping to create lifelong learners.

DIA parents know education is important. We wish for our children to grow up to become successful and happy individuals. We understand that education and being a member of the school community is important. will seek out volunteer opportunities and help when possible in order to make Dual Immersion Academy the best school it can be. We will be involved in planning and improving our school through our membership and participation in our School Community Council meetings.
